General Tips:

The benefits of planting with natives include minimal maintenance required once they are established, a process which takes 2-3 years. Native plants mimic mother nature and attract native animals. Be sure to include these four elements in your native planting area: food for wildlife, water, cover (ex: leaf litter), and a place for wildlife to rear their young. As you begin to increase the biodiversity in your school yard be sure to include your facility crew. Native plantings can often be confused with weeds and a well-meaning landscaper may remove the plants if they aren't aware of the project. As you develop ideal habitats for local species be sure to employ sustainable practices!
